

1. WELCOME AND OPENING PRAYER

Reverend Amanda welcomed all to the meeting and reminded everyone to make sure they signed the attendance sheet. Archdeacon Sam Thomas opened Vestry with a prayer.

2. ELECTION OF VESTRY CLERK

Karen Wilson was acclaimed as Vestry clerk.

3. ADOPTION OF AGENDA

Nicole Grieve moved that the agenda be accepted. Seconded by Jim Foubister. Carried.

4. MINUTES OF 2023 VESTRY MEETING

It was noted that Jim Foubister, Marie Foubister and Edna Braithwaite were at Vestry but not listed in attendance. Leslie Grieve moved that the names be added, and the minutes be accepted. Seconded by Carol Ryan. Carried

5. BUSINESS ARISING FROM MINUTES

No new business.

ACCEPTANCE OF REPORTS

Peter thanked everyone for getting the reports in and for their quality of work. Mavis Schmid moved to accept the reports. Seconded by Ann Hitchins. Carried

7. WARDENS' REPORT

Peter thanked the congregation for their ongoing dedication and support and remarked on how everyone is willing to pitch in when needed. We have created a wonderful Church community and are all in this together.

Deb agreed with Peter's comments and thanked Brian Bradford for his excellent Property report, remarking that previously the content of this report would have been in the Wardens' report

Brenden thanked Deb and Peter for their continued work and dedication to the church.

Duncan Mann moved to accept the Wardens' report. Seconded by Mike Moloney. Carried.

8. TREASURERS' REPORT

Brian Fogg noted that the givings have gone up for a 7% increase in revenue. Thanks to everyone for their contributions.

Operating costs are up i.e.: electricity 1%, water 12% and gas 27%.

We are doing well but need to do a little better. Memorial donations were a blessing as they allowed for some needed upgrades.

Looked into applying for rebates, not available to non-profit organizations.

Brian thanked the Property Committee for contributing much of the manpower for upgrades which is a great help in keeping costs down.

Jim Foubister asked if we had paid our Apportionment to the Diocease and Brian advised we are up to date on all the Diocesan bills. We are in an operating deficit, but our cash flow is good.

Brian Fogg moved that we accept the Treasurers Report. Seconded by Ingrid Schmid. Carried.

9. BUDGET REPORT

Brenden Fraser gave thanks for the increase in givings. We will maintain the target for givings from 2023.

Operating expenses vs revenue resulted in a \$9000 deficit. Apportionment is expected to rise significantly, we have no control over that. Church expenses are expected to rise, think "cost of living", ballpark \$14,000. Outreach will remain at approximately \$10,000.

Colour coding on report; Red for Short Term Expenses ie: office expenses, bills (regular "home" recurring output). Green is Outreach, helping others in the community, education of parishioners. Blue is saving for Long Term Expenses ie: roof repair, window replacement etc.

Brenden shared that we have a short term cashable GIC at 4.5% and a non-cashable at 5.65% however we don't want to dip into these as they are investments needed for long term.

Peter thanked Brenden and Brian for their reports and noted that the budget does not allow for much wiggle room.

Deb reiterated that we need to strengthen givings for short term cash flow and don't forget to specify "St John in the Wilderness" if you are thinking of memorial donations, so it comes directly to the church.

Amanda thanked Dave Hains for his many years of service as a Treasurer as well as a Council member. Dave stepped down as Treasurer in 2022 and he stepped down as a Council member in January 2024.

Brenden moved that we accept the Budget Report. Seconded by Marie Foubister. Carried.

Amanda reminded the congregation that new business can be brought forward at any time during the year as all are able to attend the monthly council meetings.

Nancy Mann inquired about the church bell. Mike Moloney explained it comes through a blue tooth speaker outside the church. A few people have the program on their phones however a button could be installed inside the church if needed.

14. CLOSING COMMENTS

Amanda thanked everyone for letting their names stand and reminded us we are all welcome at council meetings. She spoke of how special and welcoming this parish is and her joy at being our rector. Jim Foubister commented "settle in Amanda you're not going anywhere".

Archdeacon Sam Thomas then spoke of our joyful church community and the optimism we bring. He also spoke of how lucky we are to have Amanda leading us (this was met with a long round of applause). He encouraged us to continue to support each other and share our thoughts and feelings so we are all on the same page. He will talk with the Bishop as to how strong we are in our faith and leadership. He asked us to keep each other in prayer and announced he will be done in July as our Archdeacon.

Sandra Fraser moved that the meeting be adjourned. All were in agreement.

RECTOR'S CHARGE TO VESTRY 2025

The love of Jesus calls us our joyous praise to sing; our deeply felt thanksgivings we now together bring, for all God's many blessings, unasked yet still received, and for the generations who faithfully believed.

The love of Jesus calls us, that we may always be companions on a journey, where all the world may see that serving Christ is freedom which time does not destroy; where Christ's command is duty, and every duty joy.

The love of Jesus calls us to go where he would go, to challenge all that limits, to change, to learn, to grow, to know that Christ has freed us, that prisons are no more; for those who seek his kingdom, Christ opens every door.

The love of Jesus calls us in swiftly changing days, to be God's co-creators in new and wondrous ways; that God with men and women may so transform the earth, that love and peace and justice may give God's kingdom birth.

Many times in the past 4 years, and even more often this year since I've become an archdeacon, I've had people from other parishes ask me which parish I serve. When I tell them I'm at St. John in the Wilderness they often ask me follow-up questions, usually some version of "what is your parish like?", and "do you like it there?" Because I answer these questions so often for other people, I wanted to take some time in my charge to vestry this year to share with you the answers I give to others, using the 4 verses of the above hymn, "The Love of Jesus Calls Us".

Verse #1: Gathering in Thanksgiving

Any time you gather, whether for a celebration or even something difficult, there is such a sense of thanksgiving and togetherness. Sunday mornings are the highlight of my week, coming together and sharing in worship with you. I particularly love the time before we officially begin, the conversations and laughter that I can hear from the hall... and some weeks before the 8:30 service, all the way from my office! There is a sense of joy in this place even as you carry your own burdens. The groups in our parish that gather, whether for work or for social connection or a bit of both, offer other times to be together. And I can't forget shared food -- coffee hour, parish meals, funeral receptions, or a simple pot of tea and some cookies at a meeting. Eating together, or preparing food for others, brings you together in thanksgiving.

Verse #2: Walking Together

I am continually struck by the level of care you have for one another. I have seen you gather around people to share in something they're celebrating. I've also seen you offer support to people who are struggling. Being able to do that as a community is a real gift, especially helping to carry one another's joys and burdens in a way that is truly genuine. I've seen you encourage one another, point out gifts you see in each other, and offer practical help with tasks when needed. You take walking together very seriously, and that is amazing to see.

Verse #3: Following Jesus

Gathering and walking together implies we're going somewhere. Following Jesus sometimes feels like an easy stroll, and other times feels more like climbing a mountain. We are called to go where Jesus would go. We are called to love God (which sounds pretty simple) and love our neighbour (which is much more complicated). At the bottom of each email I send is a quotation from an unknown author: "You will never look into the eyes of someone God does not love." I believe this with all my heart, and I have seen times when I know you believe this too. You have shared significant faith moments and experiences with me, and with one another. I always appreciate your willingness to answer my sermon questions, some of which can be quite personal, sharing your responses not only with me but with each other as well. I also appreciate the questions that many of you ask me at different times in conversation. You are a community with a strong shared faith, a desire to learn and grow, and a deep love of God.

Verse #4: Co-creating with God

For me, being God's co-creators means we plant seeds. Following Jesus means we help to create God's vision for God's creation. I've spoken about this a couple of times in the past year; it's impossible for any one of us on our own to change the world. We can often feel overwhelmed by what's happening around us, whether in our families and communities or around the globe. It's easy to feel helpless when faced with so much that seems so wrong. Together as a parish I have seen you plant seeds and make the world a better place right here and right now. I have seen you plant seeds of love as you care for one another. I have seen you plant seeds of kindness and compassion and justice in how you treat others. I have seen you plant seeds of joy and peace in so many ways. This all happens in the things you say and do, the way you love God and love your neighbour.

The purpose of a "charge" like this one is not only to name what is already happening, but also to place a challenge or task in front of you. The simplest way I can do this is to encourage you to keep doing what you're doing, and grow in that. Think hard about what it means to love your neighbour, and how you might live that. Ask questions, be curious, seek to learn and grow in faith. Work to welcome and include everyone who might walk through the doors of the church.

Spend time in prayer, find ways to connect with God, and if you don't feel you know how to do that, just ask! Continue walking together in love, keep reaching out into the community, challenge your assumptions about people you don't know... and people you do know. Be the Church at its best, building up the Kingdom of God in this place. And know that no matter what, God walks with you in every moment of every day.

So that's my answer when people ask me, "what is your parish like?". And, for the record, when people ask me "do you like it there?", my answer is a very clear YES! It's always been a privilege to serve as your rector, and I am so grateful for this parish and each of you. As we look ahead into 2025 and beyond, my prayer for you is that you can see yourselves as I see you. I pray that you know you are called by name, created in the image of God, and deeply loved. I pray you recognize the gift of gathering in thanksgiving, and you see the loving and caring community that is formed when you walk together. I pray that your love for Jesus continues to grow as you "go where he would go", and that you continue planting seeds of kindness, justice, peace, compassion, joy, and love wherever and whenever you are able. I pray the same for me, with God's help.

OUTREACH

Outreach, the work and sometimes education of our parish in our community and beyond, is central to who we are. In 2023 our Council reviewed our outreach document and agreed it reflects our philosophy and approach well; it is called "Approach to Outreach – St. John in the Wilderness, Bright's Grove". In 2024 we looked at this document at times to help guide our thinking. It provides outreach criteria, a pragmatic description of our approach and some examples and is available upon request.

In total, our financial contribution toward this work has been \$10,158 for 2024. This money has been shared among the following groups:

We had no children attend Huron Church camp, so directed funds for this to other items above.

All through various group reports you will see the outreach work of each of the groups in the parish as well – beyond the financial contributions above. Even fundraisers become outreach work as the wider community comes together in meaningful ways with a common goal and we often help folk along the way, be it via distributing a little honey to a folk in need or sending extra food from the Triathlon to the Huron House Boys Home.

We purchase, knit, crochet, and sew prayer shawls, hats, mitts, scarfs, and more for people in our community and beyond, bringing them, as best we can, warmth and love. Parishioners supported 2 local families at Christmas. Our honeybees brought many of our neighbours together, contributing to a sense of community and well-being. Support of Inn of the Good Shepherd both financially, and with our labour and donations of groceries and clothes throughout the year as described in The Inn Vestry report involves 35+ parishioners and 600+ of hours of work important to people in need of help in our community. As a parish we try to focus on a few needs that we can work together to meaningfully address as a group – a key part of our parish's identity.

We must continue to aim for a balanced operating budget. It is within sight, and we believe with a little more work from all we can reach that objective. Thank you all for your continued vital personal givings. We encourage you to bring your friends to church, we love to share our community and God's love and wisdom - we need to grow a little to do so sustainably.

Our Property Committee may have the longest report here and we thank Brian Bradford for leading the charge on that front. From a property perspective we believe we can finally declare recovery and rejuvenation from Covid. Annual and other maintenance items, of course, will continue, and we welcome volunteers who will help. Going forward we have fewer projects, and they are targeted more at parishioner/community engagement (sound and video management – fun things).

Overall, it has been a positive year. We thank you for that.

TREASURERS' REPORT 2025

Givings revenue for 2024 increased 5.2% compared to 2023 with the efforts our parishioners from donations through envelopes, E Transfers and pre-authorized payments. Above plan Open Revenue, Investment Income and Hall Donations contributed to the Operating Revenue gain. We were above our planned budget forecast Total Operating Revenues with the cashing of a GIC in October.

Our cash positions was enhanced by the contribution of Fundraising well above plan and Memorial Donations throughout the year.

Operating expenses were above plan by 3.4% with higher energy costs, apportionment, insurance fees as well as increased salary and benefit charges compared to 2023.

Our bank balance at year end was higher than 2023 that enabled us to support community Outreach initiatives and Capital commitments as well as on-going church upgrades undertaken by the Building Committee and church members. The cash requirements for the capital upgrades were supported by the Memorial Donation mentioned previously, which did not involve the use of church Operating Revenues raised by parishioners.

Overall 2024 was a very good year for the parish. As we move forward there are a number of challenges we face with higher energy costs, increased apportionment assessment and insurance rates. We need to maintain our momentum of continuous growth in Operating Revenues compared to Operating Expenses to be a sustainable parish in our community.

Thank you to all parishioners for their support and efforts to maintain and upgrade our church and its environs. Special appreciation to those who assisted in the support of the financial aspects of the parish such as the counters, depositors, Heather and Sandra L.

INN OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

Feeding some of Sarnia's hungry on the first Saturday evening of each month is one of our primary outreach programs at St. John in the Wilderness – and we have done this, with love, respect, and camaraderie, since about 1988 – over 35 years.

Over the year this involves about 35 parishioners and friends. We purchase and cook food and serve it; between servers, cooks, and our miscellaneous shopper we put in about 50 hours of volunteer time each month or 600 hours per year. Our parish people are an integral part in The Inn's mission to provide services with dignity to local people who need food, shelter, and other essentials.

Jundi, his siblings, and friends attended the schools that were built. They received medical care, learned to work and his family and community became self-sufficient. We met our commitment and, at 18 years of age, Jundi sends his gratitude to us for our sponsorship.

On December 18, 2024, St. John-in-the-Wilderness received news that another child needed our sponsorship. Eufrasio Benetido Lazaro is a 2 year old boy from Monapo, Mozambique. Like Jarso, Monapo is a new community needing the help that sponsorship of its children can provide. Our commitment of \$50/month will be put toward Eufrasio's care as well as the development of a clean water and irrigation system, health care, schools and other services necessary to build and sustain this child, his family, and his community.

The future of Jundi, his family and community, is bright and blessed. Our hopes and resources can now be directed toward helping Eufrasio Benetido Lazaro. Thank you for joining me in making this commitment part of our outreach to God's world.

BEEKEEPING REPORT 2024

This was the 4th year of beekeeping at St John in the Wilderness Church.

Neither hive survived the winter this year (darn!), so we brought in two new "nucs" from BLB honey in Dresden to repopulate. Both hives were very well-behaved and productive!

The weather was a little unusual this year, with colder weather earlier in the spring, and very dry weather through much of the summer. This resulted in very little honey production early in the year from the bees, but they made up for lost time in July and August! We ended up harvesting about 90 pounds of honey from the hives.

The ACW ladies hosted another very successful VBS camp, glorious snacks and crafts. Thank you VBS & Leslie Grieve! It was a fun, last minute event!

Our annual honey sale was on September 28. We sold out in a blistering 25 minutes (come early next year!). Haley & Doug both donated their personal honey sales as well, totalling \$2,444. Thank you, St John in the Wilderness and our bees!

TECHNOLOGY

There has been quite a bit of work done with technology in our building in 2024. With the April move of a speaker from the chancel (front of the church) to the rear of the church to allow for better audio to the purchase and setup of a new projector in December of 2024. The permanent Projector Screen in the Church was installed in 2023 and will be used with this new projector. With the Church Hall being painted in 2023 the hall east wall has been purposely kept clear to be also used with this projector. The projector will be used for presentations / meetings and other special events like movie night. The projector was purchased with memorial funds and given to the glory of God and in loving memory of Ken Walker.

On November 8, 2024 the church internet speed was increased from 20/10 Mbps to 80/30 Mbps. The newly negotiated cost for the Phone / Internet has decreased for a yearly saving of more than \$925.

A future technology addition in 2025 will be a new computer for the secretary. This is required since this computer runs Windows 10 and the end of support for the security patches is October 14, 2025. We are currently working to finish a locking storage location in the kitchen for the new projector. This will allow the projector to be stored on site. We are also looking at the feasibility of a portable raised table at the front of the church to also be used for the new projector.

As you may know we need to maintain a computer network, phone system and working printer/copier. The printer/copier uses approximately \$600 worth of imaging units and toner supplies per year.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE

This is the second year for this committee. We are a sub-committee of the church's Executive. Our members include: Brent Anderson, Brian Fogg, Peter Langille, Deb Walker and me (Brian Bradford). Even though it is a relatively new committee, we have successfully accomplished quite a few projects. Some projects and tasks are small, but others are larger. Most items are done by parishioners who volunteer their time and talent.

The biggest accomplishment in 2024 was the project to upgrade **four windows** for environmental performance, aesthetics, and ease of use. The two windows at the south end of the social hall and the sacristy window were upgraded with single hung windows. The polycarbonate fixed window which protected the stained-glass windows high above the church porch was upgraded with fixed glass windows. This provides improved environmental performance, allows more sunlight in the building, shows off the stained-glass, and is a better protective layer outside for safety. It should be noted that the stained-glass windows by the altar already have an outer layer of clear glass for protection; this was done a few years ago. The funds for the four window upgrades were from a memorial fund given to the glory of God and in loving memory of Ken Walker. Moore H & Son Windows and Doors installed the windows, with parishioners doing significant preparatory and finishing work to keep costs down.

Another big accomplishment was the installation of a 10-foot x 12-foot **storage shed** on the northeast corner of the property. It rests on level patio stones and is wooden, with a steel roof. Parishioners installed shelves in it to suit our needs. A donated lawn mower, wheelbarrow and other tools are stored in it to help keep the church property looking lovely. We also store the platform used for outdoor church services in the shed. The church has needed a storage shed for a long time; it came to us via a memorial donation given to the glory of God and in loving memory of Ken Walker.

Thanks to the many of you who do many routine maintenance tasks (often on a rotating basis), you: clean the church weekly, mow our lawn, change the messages on our church sign and keep it clean, shop for our supplies, shovel and salt our walkways, and donate supplies (paper towels and garbage bags, for example, just keep appearing). You keep the pace looking great.

Other items done in 2024 are below – all but the electrical circuits and furnace repair were done by parishioner volunteers:

- 1. Seeding of northern part of sump pump trench.
- 2. Drains installed for dehumidifiers to self-drain (instead of a person doing this twice a day).
- 3. Cleaned the outside air conditioner units for more efficiency and of course to save money.
- 4. The red carpet was shampooed. It was very dirty. This is going to be an annual project.
- 5. A speaker was moved from the church chancel to the rear of church to help parishioners hear the services better (such as myself).
- 6. New electrical circuits were installed in the kitchen (no more tripping breakers, especially on pancake day). This was enabled by the 2021 upgrade to 200 amps, which was done to support air conditioning of the hall.
- 7. The furnace for the main church area was repaired in December going forward we will have routine maintenance done on it each fall.
- 8. Extended north native gardens to the west as a memorial given to the glory of God and in loving memory of Charlene Adams.
- 9. All the church gardens were mulched in the late spring
- 10. In the fall leaves were cleaned up all around the church.
- 11. In the summer the north wall of the church and hall were pressure washed to remove green algae growth.

Projects for 2025 are to put a new method of closure on the church's outdoor sign for ease of use, repair a soft spot in a small section of the storage room floor, install a cold air return into the storage room, continue to monitor the crawl space areas for integrity of our structure (particularly given the water we sustained there during Covid), and continue to look at means to enhance sound and video management in the church proper and the hall.

It was a very good idea to form a property committee. We have improved the building and the property for the parishioner and the community around us. We will continue to do this into the future. We all want a safe, properly functioning, robust building to worship God and socialize in.

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

We feel very blessed to have the children we have attend our Sunday School; and that our attendance, perhaps, may be recovering from Covid. We averaged 1.1 children per Sunday; this was true with or without July and August being included. Highest attendance occurred near Easter and Christmas. Two new families began to attend in the second half of 2024 – a joy!

Twelve children from 6 families in our congregation accounted for 60% of attendance. Nine children from five visiting families outside of our parish accounted for 40% of attendance, with two of those joining our parish by year end.

Lessons tend to focus on God's love, the philosophy of love, and wisdom – both in leadership and in following. Lessons are tailored to the ages of the children who join us on a given day. We get the kids out into our glorious yard of trees, native flowers, and lawn whenever we can. We continue to use a web-based curriculum called Sermons4kids (www.sermons4kids.com), augmenting it as we choose.

Leslie Grieve and Deb Walker co-lead Sunday School, with Nicole Grieve; Morgan, Perrin, and Durham Langille; and Carolyn, Evan, and Lanna Iacobelli being back up teachers should we need them. Sunday School is a very meaningful and fun way to engage with kids.

Leslie Grieve and Haley Walker led a buzzing VBS morning Bee camp in early August, with about 15 children attending, many from outside of our congregation. Thanks to all the volunteers supporting this - Nancy's bee-autiful crafts, Sandra F's sweet food, Nicole's hive of organization, teens Ally and Lauren's buzz-of-the-party kid support...plus parents, grandparents and others who provided much needed hands and care.

Spending in 2024 was about \$500 for Sunday School and VBS – which was donated without tax receipts. There was no curriculum cost, funds were used for printing, snacks, and craft supplies. Spending for 2025 is expected to be about the same.
